We have more water again this year. Our lake level at ice out was 8.58 feet. After the 2.2 inches we received on June 9 the level increased to 8.90 feet. Last spring the lake level at ice out was 7.2 feet. As in the past couple of years the highwater level has produced a lot of debris in the lake. On June 8th I towed a log that was at least 14 feet long and 12 inches in diameter to the back bay where the loon nest is located. The next day I towed another log that was about 6 feet long and 8 inches in diameter to the back bay. I will secure them and they will help to provide fish habitat. There are a number of docks under water. If one of these is yours, please either raise it or mark it so it is not a hazard. And be cautious while boating. If you see floating debris that you cannot remove yourself please contact one of the MLRA board members (listed later in this newsletter)

An interesting visitor showed up at our house in the early morning of June 9. Its presence was announced by our dog at 5am. I looked out but did not really see anything until about 6am. A snapping turtle was on our sidewalk near the entry to our house. It had dug a hole and presumably buried its eggs in the flower garden. We did not dig down to see if there were eggs so we don't know if there are eggs or if a noisy dog disturbed the process. It is interesting that the hole was next to a small decorative copper turtle in the flower garden.

You can see the back of the decorative turtle on the right side of the photo. I have also included a picture of the decorative turtle taken looking at it from its front to help you identify it in the first photo.


Loon News

Lake Report

The 2019 Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP) Lake Report shows that Moon Lake continues to be an Oligotrophic lake - that is a generally deep and clear lake with little aquatic plant or algae growth. These lakes maintain sufficient dissolved oxygen in the cool, deep-bottom waters during late summer to support cold water fish, such as trout and whitefish. The entire report is included in the email distribution as a separate PDF if you should wish to review.

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Today the talk is all about high water levels...What a different conversation 25 years ago:

MOON LAKE WATER LEVEL

In our last newsletter we reported that Mr. Don Winne, Executive Director of the Michigan Lakes and Streams Assoc., was doing some research to help us determine why the level of Moon Lake is approximately three feet below the historic high water mark.

Mr. Winne recently reported to us that the drop in water level can almost totally be explained by a change in the annual precipitating patterns over the past 55 years. Precipitation data was obtained from the US Forest Service (Watersmeet Water Station) for the period of 1940-1995.

For the 30 year period of 1940-1969 the average annual precipitation was 34.02 inches. The average for the 25 year period of 1970-1994 was only 30.79 inches.

Mr. Winne states "an average deficit of 3.23 inches per year for 25 years is significant". To make matters

worse, the total deficit for the last two full years alone is 15.73 inches (1993 - 25.19 inches/1994 - 27.12 inches).

Although we are concerned about our lake level, it is at least somewhat reassuring to know that Mother Nature is the cause of our lower water, rather than activities going on in our watershed area.

Incidentally, the watershed area for Moon Lake is 547 acres. (Moon Lake is 93 acres.) Interestingly, our watershed area does not include the Land O' Lakes golf course, Little Moon Lake or Twist Lake. It does include the large marsh area to the west of West Moon Lake Road (including Davis Lake) and east of Highway 45 on the north end of the lake. (see map below)

All we need to do now is to ask Mother Nature to "reign" upon us in the form of rain and snow, especially at times when we are not here! -- John Sick
