June 24th Rare Sky Event! 5 planets and the moon together! Catch a glimpse of a rare sky event on this midsummer morning All five naked eye planets - along with the Moon - will be visible in the sky at i once! Step outside at approx. 4:20am (40 min before sunrise) and look towards the southern and eastern sky. The most interesting part? They will be lined up in their true order out from the sun. Mercury, Venus, the Moon, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn! It's been about 100 years since a similar compact parade of planets graced our skies, and you'll have to wait until 2041 to see such an arrangement Taken from the Farmer's Almanac gain.

"With an average TSI score of 35 based on 2021 Secchi transparency, chlorophyll-a, and summer total phosphorus data, this lake is rated as an oligotrophic lake. While the trends for individual parameters are mixed, the overall nutrient levels in the lake are largely unchanged since monitoring began."

Moon Lake Memories...

The Summer of George Steve Sunderland

When I was a kid in the 1960's, I would spend the 2nd half of each school year dreaming of being back up north at Moon Lake for the summer. I knew it would be a memorable time but the summer of 1968 turned out to be more memorable than most.

As was our weekly custom, our family piled into the car for a scenic drive. First stop was the Dari Maid for an ice cream cone and then we'd begin the loop drive from Forest Rd 6320 to Thousand Island Lake Rd to Highway B to Moon Lake. We loved that drive (and still do) as you never knew what wildlife you might see.

On one particular June evening our ritual played out again but this time it all went sideways. While heading down Thousand Island Lake Rd, my dad saw a small animal on the side of the road. It was a baby raccoon, with no mom in sight. We got out and the raccoon came over to us. We waited quite a while until it was obvious no mom was going to appear. That's when my dad made a quick decision to the delight of all of us. We were bringing it home! My dad took off his flannel shirt and picked up the raccoon and put it in the trunk.

We arrived home and then it hit us...what do we do now? We weren't prepared to have a baby raccoon. So, we slightly opened the trunk, threw in some food and left it there overnight. The next morning my dad quickly built a raccoon pen (he was a carpenter so it was easy) and we were ready to open the trunk. My dad opened the trunk... and to our surprise... no raccoon. We knew it had to be there and after some searching found that it had somehow crawled behind the back seat. It seemed to me like my dad had to take half the car apart to retrieve him but eventually he did and that raccoon went straight into the pen. So, we had a new unexpected pet.

My parents put us boys in charge of a name. It was a simple task. Our favorite cartoon was George of the Jungle so "George" it would be. Next question was how would George take to our full-grown Collie Dog, Christopher. That was also easy as they instantly became great pals. George was much, much smaller so he would ride on Christopher's back as we all set out on adventures into the forest or swims in Moon Lake and since George loved dog food it was a perfect match.

The next few weeks where a joy for three young boys and their pets. It seemed like nothing could be better. It would never end.

But my dad knew it would end soon as he'd been around many raccoons in his day. The summer had moved into August now and little George was getting much bigger, and sadly, a little meaner. Those wild instincts were kicking in. My parents knew it was about time for George to find a new home.

After a few tears, the decision was made that we needed to let George go. But where? We wanted to give him the best chance in the wild. That's when my dad said let's take him back to Thousand Island Lake. We all happily agreed.

On a beautiful afternoon in August, we all climbed into our boat on Thousand Island Lake and found just the perfect little uninhabited island. My dad grabbed George and put him on shore with a nice supply of dog food. We quickly shoved off and drifted away as George stood on a rock and looked at us. A few more tears returned for three young boys.

It took a while before we got used to George not being around and we had many thoughts about how he fared but we knew he was in the right place. That was the least we could do for him after giving us a pretty memorable summer.



Moon Lake Family Recipe Corner:



This Newsletter brings a favorite from the Mike Reiels family! Thanks Mike.

Grilled Veggies with Mustard Vinaigrette

Ingredients:

1/4 c. red wine vinegar
1 Tbsp Dijon mustard
1 Tbsp honey
1/2 tsp salt
1/8 tsp pepper
1/8 tsp pepper
1/4 c. canola oil
1/4 c. olive oil
Vegetables:
2 large sweet onions
2 medium zucchinis
2 yellow summer squash
2 large sweet red peppers, halved and seeded
1 bunch green onions, trimmed
Cooking spray

Directions:

- 1. In small bowl, whisk the first 5 ingredients. Gradually whisk in oils until blended.
- 2. Peel and quarter each sweet onion, leaving root ends intact. Cut zucchini and yellow squash lengthwise into ½ in thick slices. Lightly spritz onions, zucchini, yellow squash and remaining vegetables with cooking spray. Turning to coat all sides.
- 3. Grill sweet onions, covered, over medium heat 15-20 minutes until tender, turning occasionally. Grill zucchini, squash and peppers, covered over medium heat 10-15 minutes or until crips tender and lightly charred, turning once. Grill green onions, covered, 2-4 minutes or until lightly charred, turning once.
- 4. Cut vegetables into bite sized pieces; place in large bowl, add ½ cup vinaigrette and toss to coat. Serve with remaining vinaigrette.

10 Servings, 3/4 c. each
